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## F. Proxies and Absentee Ballots

A proxy is an amazing tool that a member may use to ensure his or her vote is counted when unable to vote in person. A proxy is the grant of authority to another person or entity to vote for the member who won't be able to vote in person. Another powerful tool is the absentee ballot, which also allows the member to vote when unable to vote in person, but the member does vote, rather than having someone else vote for him or her.

### 1. *Definition of Proxy*

A proxy is the grant of authority by a member to someone else to vote for the member. The right of corporate stockholders or members to vote by proxy in corporate matters is a fundamental right. This right is affirmatively conferred on members of condominium, cooperative and homeowners' associations by statute.

### 2. *Form of the Proxy*

In the manner provided by the Florida statute, a parcel or unit owner may appoint a proxy to vote or otherwise act for him by signing an appointment form, either personally or by his attorney-in-fact. This form can be found on the website at this link: General and/or Limited Proxy Form:

An executed telegram or cablegram appearing to have been transmitted by such person, or a photographic, photo static, or equivalent reproduction of an appointment form, is probably sufficient. So long as the proxy contains the necessary elements, is in the proper form, and is in writing, the format is probably unimportant.



Mailgrams or even hand written notes are likely to be valid proxies. Proxies, however, may not be used by directors to vote at a board meeting, nor should they be used by the proxy holder to perform other acts on behalf of the member such as tape recording meetings.

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
